The scholarship program allows for our students to go directly to campus and tell the financial aid office they would like to use the EMCID/EMCSF scholarship

to pay for their tuition, and the school will bill us directly, up to \$1.600.

Not going to Lone Star? No problem. The Scholarship Foundation reimburse will tuition costs of up to \$1,600. That means students who welding, HVAC. pursue plumbing, art school, a real estate license or those who go out of town (or the state) to learn can utilize the funds. Please utilize our tuition program. Not doing so is like throwing \$1,600 away.

Megaton Brewery Opens on Russell Palmer Dr.

After more than a year of anticipation, Megaton Brewery officially opened their doors to the public on Saturday, March 30. The new brewery is located at 808 Russell Palmer Road, next to the Nathaniel Center on the left before the entrance into the Kings Mill subdivision.

Megaton Brewery is the brainchild of Jered Montgomery and part-owner Chris Sarvadi, who also is responsible for sales and is a brewer apprentice, who bonded over a love for the process of homebrewing and homebrew beer.

"Our spouses are friends," said Jered. To add on to Jered's sentiments, Chris added, "We first started talking about our shared passion for homebrew beer near the Nathaniel Center, just steps away from where we would eventually open Megaton Brewery today."

From there, Jered and Chris partnered with an investor, Victoria Sarvadi, and business partner, JP Barkley, who also handles Megaton's marketing.

Although they had to jump through a few hurdles regarding permitting and securing their location, Megaton Brewery was born. Megaton Brewery is designed like a steampunk/fallout shelter reminiscent of the video game, "Fallout."

They have two bars – a large bar inside that boasts a poured concrete with epoxy resin counter where guests can order from taps created by Jered and play air hockey, chess or pool, and an outdoor bar close to tables where customers can play life-size Jenga or cornhole.



Arcade games are set up along an interior wall and they also have a Raspberry Pi gaming rig that features almost every "old-school" video game imaginable et up on an adjacent TV.

A unique feature added to Megaton Brewery is the Business Bench located inside of the brewery.

"We want to encourage commerce and small businesses right here in our community," said Jered. "For example, if a real estate agent brings a potential homeowner by Megaton Brewery to sign the contract on a house at our Business Bench, this encourages both businesses and we could provide a discount on beverages."

Jered added, "We want Megaton Brewery to be a place the whole family can enjoy."

Shred It EMC Rolls Into EMCID on May 4



EMCID will host Shred It EMC, a free document shredding event, on Saturday, May 4 from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. in its parking lot, located at 21575 U.S. Highway 59 North in New Caney.

"People respond very positively to this event," said Frank McCrady, President/CEO. "You don't have to do a thing. Drive up and we'll take your boxes or bags of documents, empty them into the shredding bin and they will go into a massive shredder."

More than 25,000 pounds of shredded material have been collected the past three years. All shredded documents are recycled.

Vehicles should enter through Eagle Drive by the R.B. Tullis Library and drive straight back to the EMCID Complex. Vehicles will exit right onto the U.S. Highway 59 frontage road.

Acceptable to shred: any office paper, file folders, thin cardboard, and there is no need to remove staples, paper clips, rubber bands or small binders.

Not accepted: thick cardboard, common trash, hazardous materials, plastics or metals or CDs and DVDs.

Community Development Grants to be Approved in May
