It's not every day that you get to work on a project that touches every single resident of our district (hopefully) daily. After a period of planning and negotiating over the past 12 months, EMCID has reached an agreement for GCP Paper USA Inc. to purchase 32 acres in the East Montgomery County Industrial Park for a \$200 million dollar expansion project. GCP is recognized as a leading producer of private label tissue products, like toilet paper, paper towels, and napkins, for Sam's Club, Walmart, HEB, Costco, and Aldi. You most likely have bought and used their product but just never knew where it came from. Soon, the products will come from our own backyard.

The new warehouse facility in New Caney, with an initial footprint of 190,000 sf., will be constructed within 18 months of closing. The second phase adds packaging capabilities and will be operational within 24 months. This piece includes moving their current packaging operations in Houston to New Caney as well as acquiring additional production equipment. Finally, within 36 months, GCP will add a conversion facility that takes recycled paper and processed wood and manufactures it into the large toilet paper rolls. The conversion currently occurs at its plants in Mexico.

This project will create over 200 additional jobs for our local community, and it will be one of the highest ad valorem value projects to ever come. This exciting project will result in an additional \$200 million dollar investment and an increase in revenues for Lone Star College, local schools, ESD 7, law

enforcement, and other entities which rely on higher taxable values within their boundaries.

Commissioner Matt Gray and Entergy were both vital partners of this business move to ensure the appropriate utilities and infrastructure were in place, insuring GCP selected EMC as their new home.

All 6'7" towered over me as he leaned in to shake my hand and with a booming voice said, "Hi. I'm Ryan Bonifas." I quickly learned that everything about him would be as big and bold as Texas.

One would immediately assume he played basketball while growing up in Ft. Worth, but no, baseball is his beloved sport. Ryan played college baseball at Eastfield College in Mesquite and Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi before finishing his undergraduate degree in Communications with an emphasis on Journalism at the University of Texas at Arlington. And, like most north Texans, the Texas Rangers are his team. With his larger-than-life personality, it's no surprise that he's one of the originators of "Hank's Homies," a crazy fan club of former Ranger Hank Blalock, who played in the mid- to late- 2000s.

But baseball would end up being something to enjoy, not something to work for. With degree in hand, Ryan pursued venue and event management. His career began at the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra as the Production Manager for performances at Bass Performance Hall and Festival Manager for their 5 week outdoor music festival, Concerts in the Garden. As Director of Venue and Events, Ryan went to work revamping the improvement district's building to make it more of a rentable venue, rather than a government office building that sometimes served as a wedding venue. The building was rebranded as The Atrium Center, and after numerous repairs and some updates, it reopened in December 2021 and has held over 120 events and welcomed over 10,000 attendees since then.

He's been heavily involved over the last two years in planning and designing the 218,000 sf conference center EMCID will break ground on this year. Who knew there would be so many decisions to be made? Literally, thousands. His next decisions may be the most important: build an expert staff that will help make the facility top notch in customer service and operations.

It's a big job, but there's none he considers more important than being a father to son Brooks. He's Ryan's mini-me, athletically inclined, smart, inquisitive and all boy. Brooks is also a lot of fun — just like his dad.

We're blessed to have Ryan as an employee — even if he seems like a pesky little brother at times — and we can't wait to see what he accomplishes over the next few years.


